On August 13, Supervisor Yvonne B. Burke joined Terri Maguire, Chief Deputy of the County Public Library, Councilman Mike Gibson and Mayor Jim Dear of Carson, (*pictured below*) to announce the renaming of the Victoria Park Library in the City of Carson to the Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Library. In her motion to rename the library last January, Supervisor Burke explained “There is no more fitting a space in which to pay homage to Dr. King’s legacy than a public library – a safe haven and center of learning filled with the materials and resources that enhance our knowledge of history, and enlighten us on how to be better informed, tolerant human beings.”

The renaming of the Martin Luther King Jr. Library is part of a master plan to enhance Second District libraries. The Compton and Gardena Libraries have recently re-opened after renovations and the Lennox and Woodcrest Libraries will undergo major refurbishments this fall.

Supervisors Join Elected Officials to Protect Local Government and Transportation Revenues

Supervisors Don Knabe, Zev Yaroslavsky and Michael D. Antonovich joined other elected officials at a press conference recently on the steps of the Hall of Administration to commend the Governor’s pledge to protect local government and transportation revenues under Propositions 1A and 42, and urge the Legislature to find a long-term solution to balancing the State budget without borrowing from local government.



Fraud and Identity Theft Prevention

Typical Fraud Schemes Explained

Pigeon Drop or Lottery Scam

In this type of scam, the suspects work in pairs. One befriends an unsuspecting citizen, the “pigeon,” claiming to have either a large sum of money he just found or the winning Lotto ticket. He cannot go to a bank because he/she is an immigrant or another plausible sounding reason. As the first suspect is talking with the victim, the second suspect approaches and gets involved. One of the suspects will go to a phone and call a lawyer. The suspect returns and says they can keep the money and split it three ways but to get their share, all have to put up some “good faith” money. The second suspect shows he has his money with a roll of what appears to be cash. Everyone agrees to get the money then meet at a designated place to divide the proceeds. The victim contributes his “good faith” money, as well as the second suspect, by putting the money into a bag. You are then given the bag to hold while the two suspects go to collect the money. Covertly, a switch has been made and you’re left holding a bag containing only shredded paper.

Charity Switch

Very similar to the Pigeon Drop, but with a slight variation: You are approached by one suspect who claims to have recently come to America with a large amount of cash to be delivered to a church, but no one is at the church. The suspect tells you he must leave the country soon and asks you and another person (a second suspect) to deliver the money later. You are asked to put up “good faith” money to show you are honest. The suspects switch the money and disappear.

Advance Fee Scams

In these types of frauds, you are contacted, usually by telephone, and told you have won a grand prize which is a very large sum of money. To collect the winnings, you must pay the taxes/fees up front for the money to be sent to you. The money you send is usually to a location out of state or another country such as Canada or Africa. After a short period you are contacted again and told there were problems with the winnings and you must send additional money to collect your prize. The prize never comes, and you realize you have been scammed.

Street Signs Upgraded in East Whittier

Supervisor Don Knabe unveiled new street signs recently that will be placed throughout the unincorporated community of East Whittier. The upgrades are part of a project currently underway by the Department of Public Works.

The project is part of a Countywide program to increase the visibility of street name signs along roadways with speed limits of 30 mph or greater. These new signs will have larger lettering and will be easier to read at night, increasing safety and mobility on the major streets of the East Whittier community.

The signs will include the community name along with the Los Angeles County Seal as a symbol of community unity already strong in East Whittier. Over 114 signs will be installed along the major streets in the community.

Supervisor Knabe (*pictured right*) was joined by Whittier-area community leader Jean Wall to unveil an installed sign at the intersection of Tigrina Avenue and Imperial Highway on August 27. Public Works expects to complete this project by the end of 2008.



Dial 2-1-1 and Access County of Los Angeles Services

How do you easily contact the County of Los Angeles? Where to report a lost dog, graffiti or illegal dumping? Where to call when in crisis?

The County of Los Angeles reminds the public it can easily access County services simply by dialing 2-1-1 from a land line or cell phone. 2-1-1 is the County's assistance and information line. It is the 4-1-1 to County services.

Multi-lingual staff at 2-1-1 provide free referral information on a 24-hour basis for assistance in such areas as municipal services, social services, health care, mental health services, food stamps, child care and more. 2-1-1 staff is also available to assist in crisis situations. Residents who reside in the unincorporated areas can access information to County agencies and can directly report code enforcement, illegal dumping, graffiti and other municipal service related matters.

Established more than 24 years ago by the County of Los Angeles and the United Way of Greater Los Angeles, 2-1-1 is the largest, most technologically advanced information and referral service agency in the nation, helping more than 450,000 people each year. It is accredited by the national Alliance of Information and Referral Systems.

The 2-1-1 service is also available through TTY, telephone devices for the hearing-impaired. Callers unable to reach the 2-1-1 service may dial (800) 339-6993, as certain business phone systems may not allow for 2-1-1 dialing without programming changes. Alondra Park Groundbreaking Ceremony

On September 8, Supervisor Yvonne B. Burke, community leaders and park patrons gathered to celebrate the groundbreaking at Alondra Park for a new \$26 million renovation project. Special guests included Councilman Bernard Parks and Lawndale Mayor Pro Tem James Ramsey. The renovations will include a new 25-meter competitive swimming pool, pool house, staff offices, water play area, skateboard park and picnic area.

Del Aire Park Groundbreaking

On September 10, the Hawthorne community joined Supervisor Yvonne B. Burke in celebrating the groundbreaking of a new \$4 million community building expansion project. The project will include several general improvements in the gym, restrooms, irrigation system, baseball/softball fields, parking lots and walkways. The project is expected to be completed by August 2010.

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Endless Chain

Also known as a Pyramid or Ponzi Scheme. This is any scheme whereby a participant pays a valuable consideration, for the chance to receive compensation for introduction of one or more additional persons into the scheme. In reality, the only people who get the money are those who are at the top, usually the organizers or suspects. Those towards the bottom get nothing.

Planned Insolvency (Bust Out)

A business fraud where the suspects request credit, via a fraudulent credit application, for small quantities of goods or services. They initially pay as agreed. The credit line and order is subsequently increased with the suspects receiving

30 to 45 days to pay. After receiving a large order, the suspects and their business disappear. Sometimes, the suspects will pay with a bad check in order to gain more time to make their escape.

Theft by False Pretenses

A form of theft whereby the possession and title to money or other valuable property is voluntarily transferred from the victim to the suspect who has made a misrepresentation (a lie). The suspect never had any intention of holding up their end of the bargain. Before you realize their dishonesty they are long gone with your money.


"Today's press conference is an extraordinary opportunity to discuss the creation of the first Los Angeles County Foster Youth Chinese Martial Arts Training Program," said Supervisor Antonovich. "The program is also the first of its kind in the nation."

"There are over 8,000 children living in foster homes or group homes in Los Angeles County – who, for one reason or another, have no parents, no homes. These youth need to know the difference

Wushu, also known as Kung-Fu, is the national sport of China that derived from traditional Chinese martial arts. It was created in the People's Republic of China after 1949, in an attempt to nationalize the practice of traditional Chinese martial arts. Since its inception, Wushu has been practiced worldwide and has become well known in the world via movies. Practitioners like Jet Li, Bruce Lee, Ray Park, and Keanu Reeves have shown the beauty of this 5,000 year-old art on the big screen.

The program is expected to begin this December, with training scheduled at Arcadia County Park.

Supervisors Fund Plan to Slow Early Jail Release Program

Nearly \$3 million is being spent on electronic monitoring devices so more nonviolent offenders can serve home detention and help ease crowding in Los Angeles County jails. A proposal made by Supervisor Don Knabe ultimately led to a change in State law last year.

The idea for increased use of electronic monitoring was presented by Supervisor Knabe to the Board of Supervisors in July 2006. After the Board approved making Supervisor Knabe's plan a legislative priority, an author for the bill was successfully sought in State Senator Gloria Romero (D-Los Angeles). Governor Arnold Schwarzenegger signed the bill in September 2007.

Under the old State law, many convicted criminals were allowed to choose between a jail sentence and electronic monitoring. Many criminals chose jail time instead of the electronic monitoring option because they knew that under the current statistics of the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department Early Release Program, if they enter the County jail system, they will likely only serve 10 percent of the time they were actually sentenced with, as opposed to serving 100 percent of their sentence on electronic monitoring.

Supervisor Knabe's proposal asked the Governor and legislators to revise the State law to ensure that the decision between electronic monitoring and a jail term is left to the law enforcement community and not in the hands of

lawbreakers. Under the new law, electronic monitoring will become mandatory for certain non-violent offenders, and as a result, it will free up much-needed space in County jails for the very worst offenders, who need to remain behind bars for more than just a fraction of their sentences.

"If a criminal receives a 30-day sentence, then why would they agree to be electronically monitored that entire time if they know the loopholes of early release mean a 30-day sentence translates into only a few days behind bars," said Supervisor Knabe. "The choice between the two should not be an option in the hands of convicted criminals. Criminals should not get to choose their punishment simply because one takes less time to complete. Length of punishment belongs in the hands of our judges and when a judge imposes a sentence, that sentence needs to stick."

"Ultimately, we need additional jail space to ensure that every criminal serves every day he is sentenced to, but until that day comes, this new funding will ensure that the very worst offenders will remain behind bars and that the electronic monitoring option will be used only for non-violent criminals," continued Supervisor Knabe.

Up to 2,000 inmates in the Los Angeles County jail system will be placed into electronic monitoring through the use of ankle bracelets. Currently only 300-400 offenders serve their time on electronic monitoring.

Supervisor Antonovich Proclaims October 5-11 as "Mental Health Awareness Week"

In an effort to raise awareness and understanding of mental health and mental illness, Supervisor Michael D. Antonovich joined Department of Mental Health (DMH) Director Dr. Marvin J. Southard and representatives from the National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI) and Pacific Clinics, in proclaiming the week of October 5-11 as "Mental Health Awareness Week."

"Mental illness affects one in five Americans every year, and co-occurrence of mental illness and substance abuse is a significant concern that requires integrated mental health

treatment," said Supervisor Antonovich. "Mental health is a fundamental component of general health and indispensable to personal well-being, family and interpersonal relationships, and societal interactions."

Mental Health Awareness Week is an annual observance, created by Presidential proclamation in 1986 to recognize "the urgent need to educate the American public about mental illnesses and their treatments," and in recognition of the National Alliance on Mental Illness' efforts to raise mental illness awareness.

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Supervisor Molina and Sheriff Baca Open New Sheriff’s Substation in East L.A.’s City Terrace

Supervisor Gloria Molina joined Sheriff Lee Baca along with residents and activists from the City Terrace neighborhood in East Los Angeles to celebrate the grand opening of the new City Terrace Sheriff’s Substation on August 23.

“We have worked diligently with Sheriff Baca and the members of the City Terrace Coordinating Council—one of East L.A.’s leading citizen volunteer groups—to bring more law enforcement visibility to this neighborhood and to reintroduce the community policing model,” Supervisor Molina said. “That is exactly what we hope this new substation will achieve.”

The City Terrace Sheriff’s Substation will serve as a one-stop law enforcement facility situated in the neighborhood. Until further notice, it will be staffed daily by at least one sworn Sheriff’s Deputy and one local volunteer. The substation will offer an array of Sheriff’s Department services including crime reporting, accessing crime reports, community public safety programs, emergency preparation training, and Sheriff’s Department Academy training.

“This is a momentous, citizen-led initiative,” said Sheriff’s Department East Los Angeles Station Captain Henry Romero.

The City Terrace Sheriff’s Substation is located at 4100 City Terrace Drive in East Los Angeles.
